Here are this week's hot topics:

Cercarial dermatitis (or swimmer's itch): We have been informed that a lake resident was recently affected by swimmer's itch, which is characterized by the appearance of allergic skin eruptions caused by parasites infecting waterfowl. This is why we remind everyone to not feed ducks or any other aquatic birds. It's also advisable to dry off quickly with a towel after swimming.

Further, it is important to keep our shoreline as natural as possible. Having only grass at the shoreline is an excellent landing and feeding ground for geese.

Invasive plant removal: Last Sunday, 4 volunteers invested in your environment by removing the common reed (phragmite) around the path. This invasive plant spreads rapidly, harming all other species. The plants are generally located on opposite ditches of the path. Please be alert, if you suspect the presence of common reed, please contact the association.

The following addresses have been cleared of the plant: 73, 77, 89, 117, 139, 163 to 167, 175 and 177. A seedling of the plant has also been removed from the lakeshore at 47.
